

February is St Valentine's month.

The Feast of St Valentine is celebrated annually and variously on February 14 around the world and the Anglican Communion. It initiated with honoring two Valentines: St Valentine of Rome, who was martyred in 269 for performing weddings for soldiers (forbidden to marry), and for ministering to Christians persecuted under the Roman Empire. During his imprisonment, he is said to have restored sight to the blind daughter of his judge, and before his execution he wrote her a letter signed "Your Valentine" as a farewell. The other Valentine (of Terni) was martyred in 273 in Africa with 'a number of companions', and little else is known about him. Apparently, abstracts of both Valentines are in many European churches and monasteries.

The day first became associated with romantic love within the circle of Geoffrey Chaucer in the 14th century, when the tradition of courtly love flourished. In 18th-century England, it became an occasion for lovers to present each other with flowers, confectionery, and greeting cards ("valentines") adorned with hearts, doves, keys and winged cupids. Since the 19th century, St Valentine's day evolved into today's global cultural, commercial celebration of romantic love.

I've had some fun Googling the different traditions held on Valentine's Day around the world. Some associate this day with the advent of Spring. Ancient Rome had linked the celebration of this saint to fertility, and Shakespeare's 'Hamlet', John Donne's poetry and Charles Dickens carried forward Chaucer's romantic approach. In the US, the first mass-produced Valentines of embossed paper lace appeared after 1847, and now the US Greeting Card Association estimates 190 million valentines are sent each year, half of which go to children. In 2010, a further 15 million evalentines were sent. Who knows how many in 2019?

Yes, we could call this a 'Hallmark' holiday. But let it remind us of the focus of the Christian gospel and the way of love opened to us that calls us back to the counter-cultural, sacrificial example of love of Jesus. And to that offertory prayer I have the honor to announce each Sunday: 'Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself for us, an offering and a sacrifice to God' (Eph 5:2). And let us love one another every day.

## A View from the Pew

#### PRESS FORWARD WITH FAITH!

One of my fondest father-son memories was playing golf with my dad and his cronies during college summer breaks. They'd always play for money and I'd be partnered up with one of them. It wasn't for big stakes, but I was a bogey golfer, so the pressure was on.



Dad's good friend Gino Ravel, a spry, slender, twinkle-eyed New Yorker who seemed to dance whenever he moved and who fittingly owned the Arthur Murray dance studio, was a great partner. Gino was an encourager and a great teacher, often showing me how to hit chip shots—one of the most important parts of the game. He'd show me where to aim, how far back to swing, and how hard to swing, reminding me to "keep your head down, Rich," which I did and BOOM! The shots were always accurate.

Yet whenever we found ourselves down after a few holes Gino—or my dad, when he was my partner—would take advantage of the "press." The press is basically a new bet starting with the hole on which you claim it. So, if we were behind a few strokes after let's say 5 holes, we'd press and start a new bet for holes 6-18. It's like a new start. And if we fell behind again, we'd do another press. Always a new start, as if to say, "hey, the past is the past and the next hole is a new day—You can do it!

Invariably, we'd prosper with the press. The concept of a new start, a new opportunity somehow buoyed our spirits and increased our confidence, mine at least.

I often remember the press during the bogeys of my life, the mistakes, the setbacks, and disappointments. No matter what, I pray, put it in God's hands, wake up the next day and PRESS on!

The Press in life is an acknowledgment that God is in control and that it is all good with God. We need only focus on being the best people we can be, following the teachings of Jesus the best we can, and to always remember that no matter the circumstance, no matter what others may do, no matter what happens (most all of which is beyond our control) we can never go wrong by doing right,

and we can improve any situation with love, care, compassion and empathy.

Regardless of the emotions or turmoil of the moment, just the act of remembering this truth will improve our play in this game of life. Our next swing will be better, our aim truer, we will do better, feel better and help others do the same.

I am no saint, far from it. But sainthood is not a prerequisite for experiencing an epiphany. Nor for God's grace to have some understanding of the Way, and to follow it though imperfectly and while often going astray, nor for documenting and sharing such insights as God's grace may enable.

And so I say to you who may be under it a little or a lot, who may have been knocked around or down, who may be experiencing irritation or grief...PRESS ON! Pray, then press on with faith! Shout "FORE!" If you must but keep pressing on! God rescues us from the traps of life. We need only believe and press on with faith.
