From the Rector

As you read this Herald, we are in the midst of Lent. There have been a variety of options offered for devotion in St Raphael during this time – a 'Fast for the Earth' calendar, a publication by ERD to focus on families and children globally, 'Signs of Life' to walk in the Way of Love with weekly video input, Rowan Williams' book, 'Being Disciples', for our between-the-services book study, and a focus on lament for our Wednesday services. I hope that you have found one amongst these offerings to accompany you on this 40 day journey to Jerusalem & Resurrection. Some enjoy the discipline of giving up something (chocolate?) for Lent – others take on something (such as one of the above, or more regular Bible reading or prayer, or visiting the homebound, serving others in some new way). The one that appeals to me this year is to take on the discipline of being more present: a good start

for me would be to go for a walk without responding to my phone. What would being more present mean for you?

Whatever your specific discipline for this season, remember the focus of the call of our Ash Wednesday readings:

- "...return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love...." (Joel 2)
- '.... As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain...' (2 Corinthians 5)
- 'store up for yourselves treasures in heaven...for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.' (Matthew 6)

And Ash Wednesday's Collect, which holds it all together in the love of God:

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent: Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Lent is a time of 'returning', 'working together with God', 'accepting grace', recognizing the treasure in our hearts, finding reconciliation and restoration with God and God's Beloved Community, as the 'watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail' (Isaiah 58).

Finance Corner

Roger Kirk, Finance Chair Thanks to the 2020 Stewardship Campaign and the tremendous response from the Parish, our finances are in good shape. Both income and expenses were within half a percent of where we should be at the

In 2020, the hard lift of moving our Rector's total compensation package closer to the median for similar sized churches in the Diocese made a huge stride forward. More work is still needed, but the 2021 and the 2022 Stewardship Campaigns will work to address those needs.

The Parish's annual 2020 budget was tweaked and approved at the most recent Vestry meeting. Income is projected to be \$207,180; while expenses are projected to be \$207,248. Note that typically once a Projected budget is set, the only "category" that is typically changed is the pledge dollar amount (this is a rule from somewhere in the Episcopal church; don't get hung up on the level). And only IF it changes.

This column will have a little tip or two about how to read or interpret budgets. Here is your first one. Projected Income is the **Minimum** that we hope to *raise* in the year. Projected Expenses are the **Maximum** that we hope to *spend* in the year. Interpreting that, more income is almost always good; more expenses are almost always not good!

Overall, my phrase at the Vestry meeting was that "January financials were remarkably unremarkable." When it comes to financial reporting, that is a fantastic sight. See you on Sundays!

A View from the Pew

Faith in the face of futility

Last summer a friend suffered an unspeakable tragedy. His sainted sister was brutally murdered during a robbery of her home. I spoke with him this week for the first time since it happened when he called to thank me for my card. Coincidentally, I had been praying for him and wondering just how he was doing, what he was thinking and feeling, for I could only imagine if that happened to my sister. Beyond the pain, I mused about whether the tragedy might affect my faith in God in some way, and if so how.

I wasn't about to get into that with him, so I let him lead the conversation and just listened. He had a lot to say. I could tell he was still very shaken and trying to work things out: was the belief system that ordered his 70 years of existence valid, or was it all a sham? Was God real, and if so and this happened, what was the point? A sister, a human child of God, nothing but pure goodness, yet this horror of horrors happened to her—where was God's protection? And insult to injury, he mused, why do so many "not good" people seem to prosper? He said it ran all over him when well-meaning consolers say, "It was just God's plan."

It was here that I jumped in. "God is a mystery, John (not his name). Well-wishers have good intentions, but I agree with you, we don't know that it was God's plan for this to have happened. And you have experienced in the most direct and extreme way an event that elicits the question, 'Why do bad things happen to good people?' I still don't have an answer to that one, but we are called to faith and trust no matter what. And the only way that makes sense to me is to see God as this mystery, but only in terms of the journey, but not the reality of the destination, eternal bliss in His Heavenly Kingdom. John, you have patients depending on you, you are so important to so many people. I can't imagine your pain, anguish, doubt and depression. You can call anytime to rap about this or anything."

He thanked me and then insisted on knowing how I was doing. He then gave me advice about my eczema, what to do and don't do. I told him I'd be coming to see him (he lives in Louisville) soon joking that I will be on Medicare in April.

But his core-shaking question still nags the persistently prayerful. No matter the fervency, no matter the constancy of faith, might a similar fate nonetheless befall us or our loved ones? For if the faith journey fails, if it is a fraud, perhaps so too our heavenly destination. That is because both flow from the same source, the same belief system, the same faith, the same hope.

Yet it is here, again, that "I" jump in. I realize that such worrisome ruminations are the mind running out of control. Mindfulness meditation teaches us to catch the mind as it runs amok, then interrupt it with awareness. Acknowledge the thoughts, be they negative or positive, then let them go and return to the breath, the present. And the reality of the present moment is that God is real, faith is alive, and hope is everlasting.

Therefore, KEEP THE FAITH. Think positive and pray expectantly all the time, for yourself, for others, and for ALL! Pray as Jesus taught:

Matthew 21:21 21 Jesus replied, "Truly I tell you, if you have faith and do not doubt, not only can you do what was done to the fig tree, but also you can say to this mountain, 'Go, throw yourself into the sea,' and it will be done.

Mark 11:22-24 22 "Have faith in God," Jesus answered. 23"Truly I tell you, if anyone says to this mountain, 'Go, throw yourself into the sea,' and does not doubt in their heart but believes that what they say will happen, it will be done for them. 24 Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours.

James 1:6 6 But when you ask, you must believe and not doubt, because the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind.

We are all going to leave our earthly skins someday. But heaven is real, and its' bliss awaits the departed no matter how dreadful the transition. Our faith should celebrate their ascension and have us look forward to a heavenly reunion. Until then, we have work to do, we have sunrises, puppies and butterflies to marvel about, and a God to praise.

Yes, we grieve. But we believe and go forth with the faith of a child.
