From Our Rector

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I'm so looking forward to a mini silent retreat December 2-4, and a morning's retreat with the Rev. Canon Dr. Helen daughters of the King on December 11. Retreats may not be possible for us all. It gets so busy, I know, but I hope you will all be able to find some way to reflect on the 'Reason for the season' this Advent.

The Advent journey can be likened to 'coming home for Christmas' (cue for a song!). Over the weeks of Advent, you will hear me speak quite a bit (because the Luke readings lend themselves to the theme) of 'home'. Homesickness, coming home, invited home, home by another way. Luke offers us the widest of the Gospels' nativity story, and there are lots of travelers in the frame. A season of the church is a great opportunity to follow a theme that helps us see the story from different angles, and perhaps envision ourselves in the picture.

I have found a little devotional that picks up on all the singing around the birth of Jesus: songs from Zechariah and Elizabeth, Mary, Simeon and Anna, and an angel choir. It's called 'Heaven and Nature Sing' and goes through Advent to the Christmas season and beyond to Epiphany on January 6. In the family and shut-in Sage's gift bags for Advent, there will be chalk so that you might also mark the entrances to your home and bless your homes with your families. Just like the families of Israel marked their doors at the time of Exodus from Egypt and slavery, so we ask God to protect and bless us in 2022. In this little book are other table prayers and blessings for you to use during this season.

Devotions are not just found in books. A friend recently sent me a link to a wonderful website for devotionals on the life of Hildegard de Bingen, a German 12th century woman mystic, poet, composer, philosopher, artist, ecologist. Take a look at some of these readings here: www.livinghildegard.com/blog. If you click on one blog you will be able to sign up for ongoing Advent devotions related to this visionary woman, providing for a different angle on Advent.

And if all of this seems like too much for this busy season, another friend offers Advent calendars that give the briefest of thoughts for each day. See this link: https://thomasmousin.com. He adds his own poetry, and this year's follows:

Take winter greens and form a wreath, with candles set to light. Then listen to the prophets' words however long the night. Come, sing with them their songs of hope, the coming of God's reign. And with them dare to listen for a mother's birthing pain.

For not by power or by might shall come the Promised Day, But rather from a helpless child upon a bed of hay. So listen for the sound of love, as Word enfleshed becomes, Our Way and Truth, our song to sing so that God's will is done.

Our annual meeting elected 4 new vestry members (3 haven't ever served on the vestry of St. Raphael's!) and I'm so excited about welcoming them this month as people that will help shepherd our church over the next 3 years. We are in great hands!

In my last article this year as Sr. Warden, and coming off our annual meeting, I wanted to re-emphasize the accomplishments of this past year. We welcomed a new choirmaster/organist, Clif, who is incredibly talented, and we are so lucky that our past choirmaster/organist, Melinda, continues to join us in the pews each Sunday. Chris Young did an awesome job this year filling the gaps and played some beautiful music in our Sunday services. Our choir is really starting to sound great again as we emerge from COVID, and we are supporting several new high school aged scholars as they save for college. We've had several guest instrumentalists and received several new (to us) pianos that are very high-quality instruments. We now regularly have about 8-10 kids in our children's chapel each Sunday, with 4-5 awesome volunteers leading them as we invest in our children's formation. We're getting an additional group of solar panels in these next few months to help expand our care of creation and lower our annual costs. We have started to do things like potlucks, dinner church, breakfasts, concerts, bible study and other things that intentionally get us together more. We've hired a part time person (Thank you Sr. Becky for answering this call!) to help with mission/outreach, and other programming. We are getting the church cleaned professionally again after many weeks of great volunteers chipping in. Tobit's Trace also received several grants this year and there will be a bigger project come Spring 2022. The grounds look awesome thanks for some great support from parishioners. Our building is getting used daily by different outreach groups and a new church that is incredibly diverse and active. We were extremely careful during COVID and because of our parishioners, friends, and building users, financially, we are about as strong as we've been in a long time.

Although sometimes I find myself complaining about 2020 and 2021, I do realize that God has been good to us on Parkers Mill Rd. May the wonder of the birth of the Christ child capture you this season and continue to keep you faithful and active in our little part of God's kingdom at St. Raphael's. See ya in the pews!

Do you remember your first conscious click of Christmas? Mine was when I was four and half (halves are way more important at that age than at 66, nobody says, "Oh, I'm 66 and a half years old."). We were in our new home Uncle Joe built for us on Hayes Street deep within the verdant mountain majesty of eastern Kentucky in the Mayberry-like hamlet of Whitesburg, my childhood wonderland, and the origin of my song.

The mountains enveloped us and sang to us, embarking us to go tell it on top of ol' Smokey for He has the whole world in His hands. Our big picture window looked across the way to the home my grandfather built for his wife and eleven children, which was next to the Methodist church on a wide and open block. Across from that was

Main Street, where Dawahare's second store stood until our closing in the fall of 2008. Nothing was ever more Americana than Main Street in Whitesburg, especially at Christmas time in the 'fifties. Plastic Santa's, tinsel, garland, candles, star, and angel-topped trees with those mighty C-7 Christmas bulbs lighting every step along the way. And of course, the music. Oh my, the music!

My most vivid and cherished memory is the day the delivery men hoisted mom's new piano up the steep incline of the steps into the front door and right into the middle of our living room, in front of the big window with the church, the store and the mountains in full view. We—little sister Mimi, little brother Willie, and me—were all giggling with excitement as mom took her seat on the bench, Christmas songbook in place. We gathered around her as she started to play—just like in the movies, but real, but REAL! "Frosty the snowman was a jolly happy soul with a corncob pipe and a button nose, and two eyes made of coal..." we wailed with celestial joy.

Tears well now at the memory, for little Willie would not see the next yuletide. But sorrow lasts a season, God's joy a lifetime. Every Christmas has been a blessed combination of song, cheer, reverence, and love, thanks to parents with steadfast faith, and always, thanks to God.

Every year new notes join the old, creating new memories and lifting the soul ever upwards. From the day mom first played the Andy Williams Christmas Album, to the ethereal sounds of Percy Faith's orchestra, the Salvation Army brass band blaring Good King Wenceslas, to jazz, classical and pop-fueled standards, and especially to the music of St. Raphael's Christmas Eve midnight (10:00 pm) service!

After a two-year hiatus the angelic voices of St. Raphael's Choir will sing praises to heaven once again. With breathtaking organ accompaniment—and this year joined by a HARPIST—the choir will hark traditional Christmas favorites, herald the coming of Jesus throughout the service, lead congregants in a candlelit reverence of Silent Night, and rouse us into the most Holy night with Handel's majestic Hallelujah Chorus, proving once again that music does indeed meld Christmas magic.

But one day, many years ago I accidentally left some of my writings out in the open. Only a few days later I learned that they had been included in the church's monthly newsletter. I wasn't sure how this happened, but I tried again the following month and lo and behold there they were again. Eventually I discovered that Dana had been the one that it made this happen.

Dana was someone who amplified the voices of those

writing for their newsletter? But I think Dana saw something in my writings and wanted to make sure they got out there. She was a true ally. She never substituted her words for mine and valued having the perspective of a different species. I know that she didn't just do this have otherwise gone untold. It's not that she didn't have opinions of her own, it's that she understood the value of having different opinions expressed in a public forum.

But now... What will happen? What does the community do when one of its members leaves? I suppose for some communities it is enough to break them. If someone leaves, they simply can't function. Other communities perhaps try to "replace" the person. Find someone else

and try to mold them into who the other person was. But that hardly ever works either. I think a strong community learns from those who have gone before them but doesn't try to re-create that person. I think your congregation is in this third category. I believe for me but did so for many others whose stories would you've been given a good example in Dana, and that you will continue to be strong allies for the marginalized, to be thoughtful and strong in your opinions but respectful of others.
