From Our Rector

We are at the end of the church year. The Feast of Christ the King is the bookend to both the end and the beginning of the church calendar, and we now move from a focus on Luke to a focus on Matthew. If you would like to get a broad overview of the gospel of Matthew, I invite you to take a look at the 50 Day study of Matthew that we have available for sale on the entrance stand.

With the message of Christ the King, we move into Advent. We have tended to have our Annual meeting (and a parish brunch!) on that day for the last few years, and maybe, like me, you might've missed a focus on the readings with a sermon. This year, the appointed gospel is Luke 23: 33-43: the crucifixion of Christ, the mocking taunt of his title 'King of the Jews', and the criminals' questions about his identity as the Messiah. Who is this Jesus, who speaks about forgiveness, God's Kingdom, a King who died on a Cross?

Different perspectives interpret the message of the Cross differently: on the one hand, the Cross speaks of uncompromising demands and judgement, human fallenness requiring only individual conversion, and getting right with God (atonement) as keeping others out. If we read Luke from within our present culture, we might see that the Cross points to healing, inclusion, and all the other ways Luke shows us God's saving love in Jesus that dismantles all that stands in the way of God's intention for all creation. The Cross shows us the power of all that opposes God's way, but the direction set in the wilderness and in Gethsemane remains. Jesus forgives 'for they know not what they are doing.' And he faithfully witnesses to God's nature by not choosing to save himself rather than us. God's power holds all of life and death.

And this is Good News! In this beautiful, pandemic-ridden, rapidly changing world, God's mission in Jesus and the mission of the church are raising questions again about Jesus - who he is and what that means to us all in our world today. And we agree that both the mission of God and the Church is centered on the Christ who shows

the world in his life, death and resurrection just how extensive and deep is saving love. And the weeks of Advent will remind us of this saving love as having everything to do with looking forward with hope, peace and joy to the life of the new-born King, Emmanuel with us!

Take note of the events and services in Advent and Christmas, and be with us as we travel this season together. Take note of the times of services, the days when there is just one service at 10am, our Blue Christmas service for those struggling with this jolly season for any reason, and especially join us the 'Holiday Kick-Off & Open House' fun and food on December 4. Practice hospitality and invite your friends to join us! I look forward to seeing you!

The Holiday Kick-Off and Open House Potluck will follow the Advent Lessons and Carols service on December 4 at 11 am.



Money Talk

Over the last month, the Finance Committee has been drafting the budget for 2023. This draft will be presented to the vestry on November 15th and includes a modest increase in income and expenses (both less than the inflation rate). Our 2023 pledge campaign is underway and should be completed by Nov 30-so if you haven't pledged yet, please consider pledging-it really helps us manage the business aspects of the church. A strong ministry tenant (The Lexington Church) has helped stabilize the budget in 2022 and we look forward to a continued relationship in 2023-because without them, our situation would be more austere.

There are several initiatives being discussed for 2023 that have financial implications-including the modernization of our HVAC systems, and stronger building security and access. There are plans to apply for grants to cover a portion of these, but they may require a separate fundraising effort to begin implementation. Work has also begun as a result on a series of grants on Tobit's Trace to improve that feature of our property. We are being great stewards of the gifts God has provided and we really appreciate your continued support of our ministry through the advent season and 2023.

From the Properties Committee

The Property Committee remains quite busy improving our building and grounds, while also lengthening the working life of our equipment and facilities. And we truly appreciate the volunteers who have worked diligently on tackling outside projects and on planning for future ones.

We made it through another season of cooling with our current ancient HVAC units. Some are as old as 1989 models. The Property Committee has submitted a long-term replacement plan to the Vestry. The Vestry is currently studying that proposal.

There are currently underway several "outside" projects either in process or planned. A number of older and dead trees have been removed. A congregant's relative is currently looking at coming up with a sustainable and low maintenance plan for several improvements, particularly in the Columbarium area of the church. And the Fall cleanup process has begun.

Plans are underway for the deep clean of the church in preparation for the onset of the season.

And we are nearly finished with the replacement of all our current candescent lights with LED lighting. This is not only better for our "green" status but helps in a small way with our electrical and mechanical costs. The comments from the congregation have been very positive to this point.

It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year

Each year we prepare ourselves for the birth of Christ in a myriad of ways. It could be something as simple as an Advent calendar. Or maybe you have a favorite devotion book. There is music, which also plays an important part in this time of preparation.

On December 4, the choir will lead us in a service titled **Advent Lessons and Carols**. You will enjoy the wide variety of music styles in the choir's anthems as well as the beautiful hymn, "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming," which the congregation and choir will sing during Communion.

On Christmas Eve you are in for a musical Christmas gift at both services. The first service will feature our children in a musical titled "The Best Old-Fashioned Christmas Pageant Ever!" Our vocal scholars, Mason Franklin and Sarah Wiseman, will lead the children in this wonderful collection of familiar Christmas hymns and carols. The best part of the musical is that the congregation will join the children in singing "The First Nowell" and "Angels We Have Heard on High." Another special gift will be Kris Olson returning to lead us in "Silent Night" at the end.

If you want to sing more Christmas carols and hymns, come back at 10:00pm. The congregation and choir will sing "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," "Joy to the World" and "Angels We Have Heard on High." The choir will also sing two anthems and our new vocal scholar, Carrie Moscoe, will be featured in the solo "Rejoice, Rejoice Greatly" from Handel's Messiah. The music continues at 10:30pm as we sing "O Come, All Ye Faithful" for the Processional hymn. More gifts occur during the service including Michael Cannon singing "O Holy Night." The service ends with the traditional lighting of the candles while singing "Silent Night."

You can't ask for a better Christmas Eve. Advent will lead us to that glorious moment. Please plan to be here during this "most wonderful time of the year."

Godly Play program intentionally serves children's relationship with God

At Saint Raphael, our Sunday School for children is called Godly Play. This program has been a success in churches around the world for quite some time. Deacon Lois Howard, a Godly Play teacher and trainer of teachers in the Diocese of Lexington and beyond, has generously provided Saint Raphael with donations of materials and items necessary for a successful program. We are fortunate to have willing volunteers who are trained as teachers and aides. Janis Rosebrook, Diane Whorley, Amanda Whorley, and Tim Allen, along with my assistance from time to time, have begun implementation of the curriculum.

Godly Play was developed by an Episcopal priest, Dr. Jerome Berryman, in 1984 at his home parish in Houston. This program is inspired by Jerome's many years of work with children and his advanced Montessori studies with Sofia Cavaletti, a major Montessori contributor, in 1971.

Everything that happens in a Godly Play classroom - the classroom setup, the carefully chosen and placed materials, and the management of the children - serves the child's relationship with God. Additionally, what we have discovered is the Godly Play program is strengthening our teachers' faith relationships with Christ. We are free to focus on spiritual preparation and relationship-building between teachers, children, families, and Christ. This is the work Christ calls each of us to do. We invite you to visit our Godly Play classroom (when class is not in session) to admire the work Janis and Diane have put into organizing and cataloging the supplies. Thanks to Mike Booth for doing the necessary carpentry work. Join us all in praying for our beloved Saint Raphael children and for children and families whom we pray are led to our Church.



A View from the Rew

Advent: The Get Ready! Season

The humorist James Thurber wrote a story, "The Car We Had to Push," in which he described a man who went around the streets of his hometown, Columbus, Ohio, shouting "Get Ready! The world is coming to an end." They called him the "Get Ready Man."

If in December you hear somebody shouting Get Ready!, even if it's only a voice in your head, you will probably think not of the Second Coming of Christ but of the hundreds of things you think you have to do before Christmas: Gift buying, baking, decorating, writing and mailing cards, donations, going to concerts, pageants, parties—burdens we lay on ourselves but want to do even while we complain about stress and fatigue. Remember, a priest said in a Christmas sermon, "It's not your birthday."

Advent is the only season on the Church calendar that looks in two very different directions at the same time. The Gospel readings for Advent are on being ready for the Last Judgment (Mt 3 and 24). Most of us are probably not too anxious about the Second Coming of Christ—we were sealed as Christ's own forever in baptism. What Advent offers us is a time to turn away from the secular busyness to spiritual preparation for the celebration of the great festival of the birth of the Savior, when love came down from Heaven to earth. We sing the very beautiful Advent carols—"O Come, O Come Emmanuel," or my favorite, "There Shall Come Forth a Rod out of the Stem of Jesse." On Christmas Eve we will sing Christmas carols.

Through the centuries, Christmas celebration has rolled along, from the simple story told by Luke, picking up legends, customs, stories, and song, until in this century it's observed, at least in its secular aspects, all over the world by people of different religions or no religion. The reason is obvious. The story itself is beyond wonderful. The message, "God So Loved the World," is powerful. For the Church, Christmas is the one time when the eyes of the world are focused on our religion. It's the time for us to shout to the world, like Gladys in "The Best Christmas Pageant Ever," "Hey! Unto us a child is born!"
