# From Our Rector

Dear St. Raphaelites and Friends!

I'm writing this before Holy week and the journey of the Triduum through to Easter Sunday, the feast of Christ's resurrection, has not yet happened! I learnt in Durham last year that the Venerable Bede, whose remains are in Durham Cathedral, wrote that the word Easter comes from the Anglo-

Saxon spring goddess, *Eostre*, and was applied to the principal Christian festival of the year. Faith in Jesus' resurrection on the Sunday or third day following his crucifixion is at the heart of Christian belief around the world, but in the northern hemisphere, the experience of springtime is set next to the ancient stories of deliverance and the proclamation of the risen Christ. Easter occurs on the first Sunday after the full moon on or after the vernal equinox, always falling between Mar. 22 and Apr. 25. We follow Jewish custom by beginning the feast at sunset on Easter Eve with the Great Vigil of Easter. I encourage you all to participate as far as

you are able in Holy Week. I know that to treat those days as a pilgrimage towards the joy of the resurrection can be so encouraging and enlightening for our life and faith.

But then there is the 50 Days of the Easter Season. In South Africa, I came across the *Via Lucis*, the Stations of Light. This is a spiritual journey with Jesus that takes us through 14 of the events of his post-resurrection life on earth from all four of the Gospels. It is a path of transforming joy, almost like the Stations of the Cross with the Spirit of Life illuminating the Way differently. They say that these stations were discovered in the Catacombs of St. Callistus in Rome, and particularly suited to use during the weekdays of the Easter Octave (the week following Easter Sunday, that the Eastern Church calls "Bright Week"), and throughout the Easter Season. Although known as a spiritual practice from the 1<sup>st</sup> century, it has been gathered into a new devotion in recent decades,

beginning with the story of the Resurrection and following through to Pentecost. I have some small guides to the *Via Lucis* if any of you are interested to do more than follow the lectionary readings of the season and Sunday sermons during the Easter Season.

Why intentionally follow a practice of prayer and meditation during any of our Church seasons? Because it is a clear way to honor Jesus' call to follow him. Each season of our church calendar has a depth of learning for us, whether we have attended church our whole lives or just a few weeks. Faith is dynamic, the Spirit of God is at work in the world, new insights keep our love for our neighbors and enemies alive in us. Contemplative prayer lives that follow the church seasons can steady and balance us, rather than simply focus us on national holiday & Hallmark celebrations. We can come to see those holidays as spiritual markers for our lives. Times to enjoy peace and happiness, love and friendship, family bonds, compassion, respect for one another and for the Sacred. Maybe opening ourselves to new journeys like those which the church seasons offer us may awaken us to blessing, gratitude, a new vision of ourselves and possibly even imagine a new way of being in the world.

And maybe that's what we and the whole world need right now! With love,

### Senior Warden's Forner

We are nearing Holy Week and Easter, the time when we hear the essential story of our faith, Jesus' last days, entering Jerusalem, the Last Supper, the crucifixion and resurrection. We've heard it before. Why do we need to hear it again? Because great stories deserve to be told and heard repeatedly. In the times when writing and reading was rare, stories were kept alive through oral tradition. These days we are bombarded with more stories

than we can handle. How can you make this familiar Easter story fresh? Here are a few ideas:

Change which services you attend and attend more of them. On Palm Sunday the whole of Holy Week is crammed into one service. Try to take in more Holy Week services so you get a fuller picture with more detail. Try Maundy Thursday, Stations of the Cross, Good Friday. Walk through Tobit's Trace following the Stations of the Cross we have online any time that fits your schedule. https://sreclex.org/tobits-trace/explore-tracks

**Lean into the readings.** In the Episcopal three-year lectionary cycle we hear the same Gospel readings every three years. This year, Year A, we are hearing the story from Matthew's Gospel. Last year we heard from Luke's. How are they different? Cultivate curiosity. Explore our lectionary at <u>lectionarypage.net</u>.

Try to get into the minds of those who played a role in the story. How would you feel about taking the donkey and colt for the Lord? Imagine being amid the crowd crying for Jesus' crucifixion. What might that have been like?

**Welcome newcomers.** Many who have stopped attending church are called back to practicing their faith during Holy Week and Easter. Some may be new to our church, to the Episcopal Church, or may never have been in a church. Watch for new faces and offer help finding the Book of Common Prayer, knowing when to stand or sit, or finding the restroom.

**Get involved in the life of St. Raphael's.** Sign up for Dinner Groups, plan to attend Dinner Church, and/or Sages and Friends. Attend a committee meeting. Teach young people, help old people, join the choir, arrange flowers, help prepare the altar for worship. Learn about opportunities when you subscribe to the Eminders at <a href="mailto:sreclex.org">sreclex.org</a>, or talk to Rev. Helen for help finding ways you can offer your interests and talents in service to God at St. Raphael's.

# From the Junior Warden

#### New Building Use Guidelines and Agreements

Our building is in ministry with a growing number of community groups using our building. The Properties Committee and Vestry felt it was time to review and update St. Raphael's wedding policy and building use agreements, which had not been revised since 2015.

Under the new guidelines, all persons (both members and non-members) using the building and property of St. Raphael's must receive permission and have their meeting or event placed on the church event calendar. Here are the steps for getting on the church event calendar:

- 1. Contact the Church office to check availability.
- 2. St. Raphael's committees, ministries and mission uses can be automatically placed on the event calendar without a signed written agreement. For example, a Sage and Friends gathering or a youth group social event does not require an agreement.
- 3. If the use is a wedding or funeral, the office will schedule a time to meet with Rev. Helen.
- 4. For all other uses (whether by a member or outside person/group), the office will schedule a time to meet to discuss the request and go over the building use policy. Once the use is approved by Rev. Helen, the office will send an agreement for signature.
- 5. When the signed building use agreement is returned and any required deposit is received, the use will be placed on the church event calendar.

All uses (other than St. Raphael's committee, ministry and mission meetings and uses) will require a signed building use agreement even if no rental fee is to be paid. This includes all private meetings and events sponsored or held by a member. Questions or concerns about requested uses and agreements should be directed to the Jr. Warden and Property Committee.

Moving on to another topic altogether, Rev. Helen asked in a recent weekly meeting what worship means to me. I answered that for me,

worship is the anticipation of the unknown, something I cannot explain or put into words. When those unknown moments occur, they are unlike any other experience in the entire universe. Allow me to make that point again: *In the entire universe*.

Climbing a mountain for a scenic view is exhilarating. Hearing waves crash on a beach are soothing. Birds returning with their songs in the Spring can warm our hearts after cold winters.

Worship can also be exhilarating, soothing, warming and more - maybe not week to week, maybe not once a month, maybe less frequently, maybe more frequently. Those unknown moments will happen in the most unexpected times.

As much time as Rev. Helen and I spend in putting worship together, there are aspects of the service for which we have no control. When something unexpected happens, you could call that the Holy Spirit moving within the gathered body. Those moments are indescribable. There is a sense that everyone else is experiencing the same feeling too.

I am thankful we have our services available on YouTube and the church's Facebook website. I was in the hospital one Sunday morning and turned on my phone to watch our service. It was during Communion and I have to admit, it brought a lump to my throat. I know, too, our live feeds go out for those who cannot attend for a variety of reasons.

For those of us who can participate in live worship, there is nothing to compare it to. What I am getting to is this: We need you back, sitting in the pews, praying, singing, participating in the responses and service songs. We need you back so that when visitors come to worship, they see a vital worshiping community. And if you come to worship, be ready to experience something like none other *in the entire universe*.

# A View from the Rew

This is the first of a series of columns on the history of St. Raphael's. It will not be in chronological order but let's start at the beginning: 1962.

Every great undertaking begins as an idea, and in a church, that idea typically belongs to a bishop. St. Raphael's began in the mind of the Rt. Rev. William R. Moody, Bishop of the Diocese of Lexington (1945-1971). Bishop Moody had a vision of new churches around Lexington named for the archangels. In the 1960s, rapid growth in Lexington was on the southside, where shopping centers and subdivisions were being built. The Bishop had established St. Michael's east of Nicholasville Road in 1955, and now, in 1962, he was ready to start St. Raphael's (that's how we got our name) in southwest Lexington. To assist him, the Bishop called on two good friends: Garvice Kincaid and Dr. Willard D. Page. A new church needs money. Kincaid was the leading financier of the day. Dr. Page was head of the Kentucky Council of Churches and professor of Old Testament and Hebrew at the Episcopal Seminary in Lexington. He was the man Moody wanted to be the priest of St. Raphael's, but first he had to be ordained in the Episcopal Church (he was ordained in the Presbyterian Church). Dr. Page (he was never called Father Willard)

deserves a column to himself and will have one later.

# A View from the Rew (continued)

An Episcopal church isn't born in a day. There's a process. First 12 adults had to sign a charter. Four of them were Gaitskills: Kent, Sonya and Kent's parents Melvin and Dorothy. Others were Pat and Wilgus Dinsmore, Charles and Evelyn Tarkington, Don Miller, Barbara Miller, Jo and James Wilhite, and Paul and Geraldine Richards. Will you be surprised to know that the first thing they did was have a potluck? The first service was Morning Prayer, held May 6 in the James Lane Allen Elementary School gym. Only a priest could celebrate the Eucharist but in the 60s it wasn't the custom to have a Eucharistic service every Sunday. Morning Prayer was the norm and could be led by some of Dr. Page's seminarians—George Kershaw, Donnell White, and William Thomas Dalton—with occasional visiting priests. Dr. Page was ordained in January 1964.

In May 1962 the Diocesan Convention recognized St. Raphael's as an "unorganized mission." Two years later the Convention recognized us as an "organized mission." It wasn't until 1971 that St. Raphael's achieved the status of a self-supporting parish, but meanwhile in 1965 the church had moved out of the school gym into a new building on Parkers Mill Road. That's a story for another day.
